Krzysztof Trzciński – Professor at the Jagiellonian University in Kraków in the Faculty of International and Political Studies, a political scientist, a historian of ideas, and scholar of contemporary political thought. He has studied international economic and political relations, political science, and European law. He is the author of over eighty academic publications (journal articles, book chapters, and books). His areas of study include conceptions of democracy and power-sharing, citizenship theory, and conceptual analysis. He currently researches various formal and informal concepts – including consociational, centripetal, and hybrid forms of power-sharing – that may contribute to the emergence of an optimal political organisation in multi-ethnic societies. He is a tutor at the Collegium Invisibile and a Life Member of Clare Hall at the University of Cambridge.

Dimitry Vladimirovich Kochenov – a Professor, he leads the Rule of Law research group at the CEU Democracy institute in Budapest and teaches at the CEU Department of Legal Studies in Vienna. In the Hilary term of 2021 he co-convoked a seminar on Citizenship by Investment at the Centre for Migration, Policy and Society at the University of Oxford. Dimitry Vladimirovich has also taught at Princeton, the College of Europe (Natolin), LUISS Guido Carli, Groningen, Turin and Osaka, among numerous others and was Émile Noël Fellow at NYU Law School. He has consulted for governments and international organisations and institutions and served as the founding chairman of the Investment Migration Council (Geneva). His latest book *Citizenship* (MIT 2019) has been translated into several languages and discussed in the *New York Review of Books*.

Adam A. Ambroziak – PhD in Economics, Professor at the Warsaw School of Economics; Head of Postgraduate Programme in Administration and Management, and Head of Postgraduate Programme in Public Aid. Statistical and thematic editor of the scientific quarterly “*Studia Europejskie – Studies in European Affairs*”. Author of over 100 scientific publications and analyses on EU economic policy, state aid policy, and

on the EU internal market; lecturer and trainer in European economic integration and in European lobbying; actively involved in Poland's EU association, accession negotiations and in the adjustment of the Polish legal system and economy to the provisions of the Europe Agreement; currently taking part in the decision-making process in the EU in the field of competitiveness and growth; lecturer at the Warsaw School of Economics, the Centre for Europe at the University of Warsaw, the University of Gdańsk, the National School of Public Administration in Poland, and at the Polish Institute of International Affairs and is a visiting researcher and professor at the University of Glasgow and the University of Economics in Bratislava.

Aleksandra Borowicz – Assistant Professor at the Department of Transport Policy and Economic Integration in the Faculty of Economics at the University of Gdansk. Aleksandra Borowicz specialises in international economics with a focus on international trade, foreign direct investment, and the economics of European integration. She has experience in applying for and implementing projects co-financed by the European Union. Member of the Team Europe network at the European Commission in Poland. She is the head of the “Acquisition, Implementation and Accounting of European Projects” post-graduate programme. She is a member of the board of PECSA (the Polish European Community Studies Association). Aleksandra Borowicz also holds a seat on the editorial boards of two journals: the “Review of European Affairs” published by PECSA and “European Integration Studies” published by the Kaunas University of Technology.

Zbigniew Lasocik – Ph.D., he is Full Professor of law and criminology specialising in human trafficking and prison systems. He serves as the Director of the Centre of Excellence's Human Trafficking Studies Centre in the Faculty of Political Science and International Studies, at the University of Warsaw. Professor Lasocik has been a visiting scholar of Columbia University in New York, John Jay College of Criminal Justice in New York, Harvard University in Cambridge and several other universities in the US, UK, and Argentina. In 2019 he conducted research on human trafficking in the US. Mr Lasocik is an expert of the United Nations, the European Commission, the OSCE and Council of Europe and a former member of the UN Subcommittee on the Prevention of Torture in Geneva. He has served as a President of the Polish Section of the International Commission of Jurists in Poland. He has participated in over 60 international fact-finding and assessment missions regarding

prisons, torture prevention, human rights and human trafficking. Professor Lasocik was the recipient of a Hołda Human Rights Award in 2015. He is a graduate of criminology, sociology, and legal studies. He is the author of over one hundred and twenty publications (consisting of books, articles and research reports) in criminology, human trafficking, human rights, torture prevention, and prison systems.

Nino Machurishvili – holder of a PhD in Political Sciences from Ilia State University (Georgia, Tbilisi). Her research interests cover the political behaviour of post-Soviet societies, with a focus on social protests which have emerged through inequality between social groups. She has obtained several research scholarships in the framework of the EU's funding schemes. Over a period of four years, Dr Machurishvili worked at the Shota Rustaveli National Science Foundation of Georgia under the Ministry of Education, Science and Sport of Georgia. She is Associate Professor of Political Sociology at Caucasus University at the School of Humanities and Social Sciences (Georgia, Tbilisi).

Driton Kuqi – PhD, a Professor of the Faculty of Law at the State University of Tetova in Tetova (North Macedonia). His academic background includes a BA in Law (basic law studies), an MA in Constitutional Law and a PhD in Constitutional Law with a specific interest on the separation of power and constitutive justice. His publication list contains papers, chapters, and monographs emphasising the role of the parliaments in the democratization and consolidation of the Western Balkans, the fall of the principle of separation of power, about constitutive justice.
