







USE TRUSTWORTHY SOURCES OF INFORMATION

Try to get information from trusted news outlets, rather than only social media.



If you have doubts, look for the original/official/ unedited documents or statements.




Be also aware that sources in articles are usually edited, summarised, rephrased, shortened.


Be aware that even reliable media can make mistakes and may unknowingly reprint or share false information. If some information seems to be too good or too improbable, be wary.



BEWARE OF DEEPFAKES

Videos on the internet can be manipulated. New technologies make it easier and easier. You can find fake interviews with famous people who have never said such words.





DO NOT FALL VICTIM TO CLICKBAIT


Stay vigilant when you see sensational, exaggerated or very emotional titles and thumbnails and be suspicious, if a headline is supported by an exclamation mark.





CHECK IF PHOTOS AND TEXTS MATCH

The larger the discrepancy between the photo and the content, the greater the chances that it is a manipulation.





BEWATCHFUL AT SPECIFIC TIMES

Disinformation campaigns are likely to happen around elections, political developments, anniversaries, as well as crisis situations.
